Duke Energy is going to be replacing a large gas pipeline that runs through Crestview Hills in 2024. The current gas pipe was installed in 1957 and, to meet federal requirements, needs to be replaced. The City has been working with Duke for several years on the route of the replacement pipe to have the least impact on property owners and businesses. The main impact will be on Rossmoyne Ave. in Old Crestview Hills and on both Chancellor Dr. and Centre View Blvd. in the Thomas More Office Park. Work is expected to start in the Spring of 2024 and be completed by the Fall of 2024.

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### Congratulations Tim Dalton

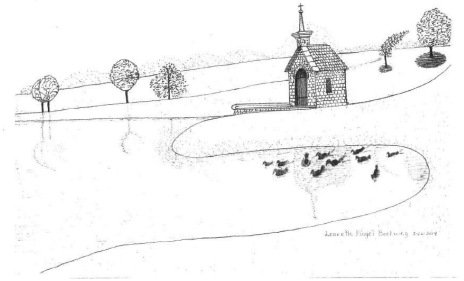

## Crestview Hills History Corner

The Little Chapel at Thomas More University originally resided in Covington, KY and called the Monte Casino Chapel. It was built in 1878 by two Benedictine monks, Father Otto Kopf and Brother Albert Soltis, in the Monte Casino Monastery, on top a hill in their vineyards overlooking Covington and Latonia. Constructed of large fieldstones found on the property and chiseled by hand to create the exterior walls; the chapel's interior dimensions are approximately 6 feet by 8 feet. In 1957, Fred Riedinger bought the property and later donated the chapel to Villa Madonna College who was relocating to Crestview Hills.



Matt Toebben was instrumental in the move of the chapel and constructing a plan of action for the relocation effort. A large drag had to be brought in from Cleveland, Ohio, to fit the entire building do to the mortar being so hard, they could not take the building a part to move in pieces besides removing the steeple. Maneuvering the chapel through Covington was a great feat as there were only 1 foot on each side while moving through the existing homes. Representatives from the telephone and electric companies were on hand to manually move wires in areas where the stone building would have ensnared the low-hanging utility lines. The move made local and national news with people lining the street to see the Little Chapel towed to Crestview Hills. Four hours later, the chapel arrived and was placed

on its new footings overlooking the man-made pond at now-Thomas More University. The chapel is now also part of the Crestview Hills City Seal.

## Public Works Updates

This has been a busy year for Crestview Hills, construction is underway on Vernon Drive from Summit Drive to Rossmoyne Drive. This work includes street underdrains, new curb & gutter, storm water improvements, etc. This project was delayed several times due to unavoidable conflicts with utility lines that needed to be lowered. This project is expected to be completed in Spring 2024. The City also worked with the City of Edgewood on storm water improvements along Dudley Road and Campus Drive to help control some of the storm water runoff from Dudley Road. This project was completed this past Fall.

Crestview Hills converted the majority of the Duke Energy-maintained street lights throughout the city to LED to help reduce electrical demand and costs and to enhance public safety. The City is in the process of converting the remaining streetlights in 2024, mostly in the Thomas More Office Park. The City is also working with Duke Energy Gas on a gas line replacement project through Crestview Hills which will impact portions of our city's streets, including Rossmoyne Ave., Centre View Blvd., and Chancellor Drive.

The City Engineer is performing a street condition assessment to help update/prioritize our street maintenance/replacement program. This information is used for budgeting and scheduling purposes. Crestview Hills was successful in securing federal grant funds for the Horsebranch Road Pavement Project and Dixie Highway Sidewalk Extension Project. These funds will help cover a majority of the costs. General street maintenance continues throughout the City which includes: crack sealing, pavement striping, street sweeping, minor pothole patching, clearing storm drains, grass & vegetation maintenance, trash pickup, etc.

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## Snow Shoveling Safety Tips

The really big snowstorms – and even everyday, run-of-the-mill snowfalls – comes a risk of death by shoveling. Nationwide, snow shoveling is responsible for thousands of injuries and as many as 100 deaths each year. So, why so many deaths? Shoveling snow is just another household chore, right?

Not really, says the American Heart Association. While most people won't have a problem, shoveling snow can put some people at risk of heart attack. Sudden exertion, like moving hundreds of pounds of snow after being sedentary for several months, can put a big strain on the heart. Pushing a heavy snow blower also can cause injury.

And, there's the cold factor. Cold weather can increase heart rate and blood pressure. It can make blood clot more easily and constrict arteries, which decreases blood supply. This is true even in healthy people. Individuals over the age of 40 or who are relatively inactive should be particularly careful.

National Safety Council recommends the following tips to shovel safely:

- Do not shovel after eating or while smoking
- Take it slow and stretch out before you begin
- Shovel only fresh, powdery snow, it's lighter
- Push the snow rather than lifting it
- If you do lift it, use a small shovel or only partially fill the shovel
- Lift with your legs, not your back
- Do not work to the point of exhaustion
- Know the signs of a heart attack and if you're experiencing any of them; stop immediately and call 911, every minute counts
- Don't pick up that shovel without a doctor's permission if you have a history of heart disease. A clear driveway is not worth your life.

## Winter Weather Information

As we approach the core of winter weather, we have listed several important reminders for residents. The City of Crestview Hills will typically issue a snow emergency when snowfall exceeds three (3”) inches, or when icing conditions create significant hazardous road conditions. When a snow emergency is issued, residents are required to remove vehicles from streets so snow/salt trucks can clear them. Vehicles impeding snow removal may be towed by the Lakeside Park/Crestview Hills Police Department.

Crestview Hills contracts with Kenton County Public Works for snow removal. If your street has not been adequately cleared within 24 hours of the winter weather event, please call the City Building at (859) 341-7373. Afterhours questions may be directed to Kenton County Public Works Department at (859) 392-1920.

The City’s snow emergency routes will be the first priority during a snowstorm (see [www.crestviewhills.com/222/Public-Works](http://www.crestviewhills.com/222/Public-Works) for a full list of street priorities). Please note that when snowplow drivers clear residential streets, snow will accumulate along the side of the roads and into driveways.

Please remember, don’t crowd a snowplow or travel beside it. Snowplows travel slowly, make wide turns, stop often, overlap lanes, and exit the road frequently. The road behind an active snowplow is safer to drive on. If you find yourself behind a snowplow, don’t follow or stop too closely, stay behind it (6 to 10 car lengths) or use extreme caution when passing. A snowplow operator’s field-of-vision is limited; if you can’t see the mirrors, the driver can’t see you. Also, materials used to de-ice the road could hit your vehicle. Snowplows can also throw up a cloud of snow that can reduce your visibility to zero in less time than you can react. Never drive into a snow cloud – it can conceal vehicles or hazards.



Please remember that snow removal operations are being performed under emergency conditions. Drivers experience extended work hours to provide safe and effective removal. The following items are what all residents need to be aware of this winter season:

- Do not deposit leaves in the roadway. Drains can become clogged with leaves that were left in the roadway which prevents melting snow from reaching the drains.
- Observe “NO PARKING” on City roads whenever snow has fallen, and the accumulation is such that it covers roadway surfaces. Please plan ahead and do not leave your vehicle in the roadway if snow is forecasted.
- Do not place garbage cans on on/in the street. Objects in the roadway are the biggest deterrent in efficient plowing operations.
- Remove all basketball posts that are located in the road or within the road right of way. Any posts or backboards left in these areas can produce damage to the snowplows.
- Leave the last two (2) feet of your driveway un-shoveled from the curb towards your house until your street is cleared. This will prevent our plows from plowing this area back in.
- If you must shovel the very end of your driveway prior to our completion, place the snow to the right of your driveway (with your back facing your house). If placed in this area, this lessens the amount of snow plowed back onto the driving area.

- A special reminder for residents who live on cul-de-sacs; these areas are particularly difficult to plow. Drivers will place snow accumulation in the most practicable area(s).
- Don't forget about clearing the snow from around fire hydrants.



## Driving Tips This Winter Season

Safe roadways are a shared responsibility, especially during inclement weather when risks increase.

Motorists, too, need to prepare for winter and remain safe by following these tips:

- Travel only when necessary, during snow events.
- Stock vehicles with ice scrapers, jumper cables, blankets, a flashlight, a cell phone charger, non-perishable snacks and a first aid kit should you get stranded on the road.
- Winterize your vehicle. Check your car battery, tire pressure and brakes. Ensure your heater, defroster, headlights and windshield wipers are working properly.
- When snow and/or ice are on roadways, drive slowly no matter what type of vehicle you drive. It takes more time and distance to stop your vehicle in poor weather, so brake early and slowly.
- Pay attention to weather advisories and allow more time to travel for routine commutes.
- Keep greater distances between you and other cars. You may be an expert in wintry conditions, but not everyone is.
- Keep your speed reasonable.
- Slow down when approaching intersections, off-ramps, bridges or shaded areas. These are all candidates for developing black ice – a thin coating of hard-to-see clear ice that can form on the pavement surface.
- Maintain a safe distance from snowplows and other heavy highway equipment, and do not pass snowplows on the shoulder.
- Winter maintenance crews can do their jobs more effectively with less salt usage on roads that have less traffic.
- Slow down: four-wheel drive does not equal four wheel stop in snowy or icy conditions.
- Know before you go. Check traffic conditions before you travel.
- **Buckle up! Put your Phone down!** Eliminate distractions while driving.

## Save Money and Protect the Environment – Use Less Salt!

Winter has arrived and that means ice! Salt is a great tool for deicing surfaces, but excessive salt is wasteful and harmful to our environment. Below are some best practices that can save you money AND leave you feeling guilt free!

- Always use a shovel first, especially if the pavement temperature is 32 °F or more, no need to waste money on deicers. Reserve deicers for ice, not snow. Shovel as soon as possible so that wet, heavy snow doesn't have the opportunity to turn to ice.
- All salt is not created equal! There are a variety of deicers which perform differently at different temperature ranges. The most common and least expensive deicer is sodium chloride ("rock salt"), but below 15 °F it's ineffective. Magnesium chloride and calcium chloride cost more but requiring less maintenance and they work in colder temperatures.
- Measure your sidewalk and driveway so you know how much you need. A general guideline is 1-3 cups per 100 square feet. Save money by only using what is needed.
- Avoid using salt and sand together as the salt will melt the ice and the sand will end up frozen beneath the surface once it refreezes. Choose one or the other.
- And if possible, try to remove the ice by hand to avoid using either sand or salt.
- If you have a common icy area, consider making it a priority to remedy next summer so you won't need to deice in the future.
- Read the labels! Be sure that you are getting the product you are paying for. Look for packaging that states the specific material you are getting.
- If there are salt piles left over, you're using too much! Scoop up excess salt to use for the next storm. Consider how much you applied and how you can reduce it next time to avoid over-applying again.

**ATTACK THE SNOW LIKE A PRO!**

**SHOVEL EARLY, SHOVEL WELL**  
Removing snow before ice has the chance to form is the best way to stay on top of winter maintenance.

**A LITTLE GOES A LONG WAY**  
In order for salt to be effective as a deicer, its important to measure out the right amount (no more, no less) for the surface you need to cover.

**SPREAD EVENLY**  
Avoid clumps of salt. Use a handheld spreader or shaker in order to achieve an even spread where the salt granules are at least 1-2 inches away from each other.

## Crestview Hills Annual Audit Summary

Crestview Hill's audit for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2023 has been completed by Chamberlin Owen & Co., Inc. The City received an unmodified (clean) opinion, which is the highest level that a CPA firm renders on financial statements. Consequently, it was determined that there are no management comments to be reported within the audited financial statements for this fiscal year, which generally means that the auditor sees no issues in how the city is operating.

Despite the strenuous economic conditions revolving around growing costs and high inflation, the City's key revenue sources were strong compared to the past fiscal year. The City added \$106,701 to the fund balance for FY 2022-2023. The key drivers to the significant addition to the City's fund balance was due to a large increase to its investment income due to higher rates of interest on the certificate of deposits portfolio, and the City expended or secured bids and/or contracts on capital projects that were transferred from the General Fund to the Capital Projects Fund and were originally planned to be completed or started in FY 2021-2022, offset against the large change in fund balance from the prior fiscal year. In addition, expenditures were much less than planned because several capital projects started in FY 2022-2023 but will not be completed until FY 2023-2024. These projects include the Thomas More Parkway crosswalk installation, street improvements on Shinkle Road (from Crown Point to Secretariat), and Vernon Drive, the Horsebranch Road Emergency Stabilization Project, and the City-wide streetlight LED conversion project. These capital projects are currently in a "construction in progress" status or have just recently been completed in this current fiscal year. Consequently, total revenue was slightly better than budget by \$3,000 or 100% to budget, and total expenditures were less than budget by almost \$700,000 or 87% FY 2022-2023. These projects continue to serve as a testimony to the City's commitment to the maintaining and reinvesting in its streets and other infrastructure, and maintaining high aesthetics.

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to the City of Crestview Hills, KY for its annual comprehensive financial report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022. This was the 22<sup>nd</sup> consecutive year that the GFOA has awarded Crestview Hills with this prestigious award. To qualify for a Certificate of Achievement, a government must publish an easily readable and efficiently organized annual comprehensive financial report. This report must satisfy generally accepted accounting principles, pronouncements of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, and applicable legal requirements. The City's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) can be found on the City's website.

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### **"If I Work From Home Where Should I Pay My City Payroll Taxes?"**

In recent months, Crestview Hills staff has received several inquiries from residents asking this question. The COVID-19 pandemic caused many employees to begin working from home, and this pattern has remained in practice even though the pandemic is over. For various reasons, employees and employers have found it mutually beneficial for employees to work from home.

As a result of this new workplace location pattern, some residents who work from home have inquired as to where should their City payroll taxes be paid: the City where they both reside and work, or the city where their employer is physically located? The answer is that, according to state law and local ordinance, work or services performed in Crestview Hills are subject to the city's occupational license fee (payroll tax). This includes anyone working from home in Crestview Hills.

With all that being said, it is also very likely that the employee working from their home in Crestview Hills may pay less in payroll tax to the City of Crestview Hills than if working at the physical location of his/her employer, since Crestview Hills' payroll tax rate of 1.15% compares quite favorably to most other cities' payroll tax rates.

## Avoiding Frostbite

Frostbite can occur in cold temperatures, especially if you are improperly dressed, or if you have problems with circulation. Frostbite occurs when a body part freezes. It most often occurs in uncovered or poorly covered areas, such as the fingers, toes, nose, ears, or cheeks. A person who is frostbitten may develop white spots on the skin of the infected area. The skin may also feel numb and painful. Frostbite can be treated by slowly thawing the area in warm (but not hot) water. You can also use body heat; for example, placing frostbitten fingers into the armpit. Medical care should be sought as soon as possible.

### How to Stay Safe in Extreme Cold

- Pay attention to the weather. When there are high and steady winds, you can lose heat from your body more quickly.
- Dress in several layers of loose clothing. Inner layers should be able to trap body heat, yet allow the skin to breathe. Wear thermal underwear made of silk, wool, or polypropylene. These are the best materials to capture heat and wick away moisture from your skin. The outer layer of clothing should be wind resistant to reduce the loss of body heat due to wind.
- Don't forget waterproof boots, a hat, gloves or mittens, and a scarf or mask to cover your nose and mouth.
- Skip the heavy outdoor chores if you have a heart condition or high blood pressure. Exertion adds the workload of staying warm and can strain your heart.
- Consider using cleats that slip over your shoes or boots for extra traction on hard-packed snow or ice.
- Avoid alcoholic beverages prior to going outdoors (and even while outside), as they can cause your body to lose heat more rapidly. Eat a healthy snack and drink a warm beverage, such as warm tea or broth. This can help maintain your body temperature in the cold air.
- Listen to the weather report for travel advisories and avoid unnecessary travel during bad weather. If you must travel by car, make sure to tell someone your destination, when you expect to arrive, and the route you will take.

## LPOCH Police Department News



As winter weather approaches, there is an increased likelihood that you may be traveling during inclement weather and/or adverse road conditions. If you must be on the road, use the **Four P's** of Safe Winter Driving.

**Prepare** your vehicle making sure everything is in working condition.

- Ensure sure your tires are properly inflated and have good tread
- Ensure your wiper blades are in good working order
- Ensure you vehicle is clear of snow, ice, and debris before departing

**Plan** your travel by checking weather and road conditions before you leave.

- Check local media sources regarding emergencies, roadway conditions, and weather advisories
- Kenton County uses 3 levels of snow emergency in regards to roadway usage and conditions
  - Level I** Conditions - Roadways are hazardous with blowing and/or drifting snow, roadways may be icy. Advisory: Cautious driving is advised.
  - Level II** Conditions: Roadways are hazardous with blowing and drifting snow and roadways may be icy. Advisory: Only motorists whose travel is necessary should be on the roadways. Residents are urged to contact their employer to see if they should report to work.
  - Level III** Conditions: All roadways are restricted to emergency personnel, travel for work, provisions, medical supplies or medical treatment, and private snow removal operations. Advisory: Essential travel only is advised. Violators are subject to prosecution. Residents are urged to contact their employer concerning work schedules.

**Prevent** crashes by learning best practices for safe driving.

- Slow down and increase following distances
- Try to avoid heavy steering inputs, accelerating, or decelerating on overpasses and elevated surfaces that are prone to freezing prior to the rest of the roadway

**Prepare** for an emergency while out on the road.

- Keep an emergency kit in your vehicle that includes blankets/cold weather clothing, water, snacks, phone charger, warning devices such as flares/LEDS/reflective triangles, shovel, bag of sand/salt/or litter, and an ice scraper.

Once you've arrived at your destination, check for local snow emergencies as they relate to parking regulations. Crestview Hills Ordinance 72.35 requires all vehicles to be moved off of the roadway during a city declared snow emergency. Vehicles in violation of the snow emergency parking regulation can impede the ability of emergency vehicles and snow plows to provide crucial services and are subject to fines and impoundment.

Thank you for helping keep our roadways safe during winter weather.


Fireman Mark Says... by Firefighter Mark Messmer

I hope everyone had a great holiday and is ready to start the new year off fire safe. Home fires occur in the winter more than any other season. As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart! Half of all home heating fires occur in the months of December, January and February. Heating equipment is involved in 1 of every 7 reported home fires and 1 of every 5 home deaths. Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators or space heaters. Plug only one heat-producing appliance, such as space heaters, into an electrical outlet at a time. Also, please be more attentive when cooking, make sure furnaces and chimneys are professionally cleaned and smoke detectors are properly maintained.
